

South High Alum to Share Book in September



During WWII, to help fund the war effort, junior high and senior high students at South High School in Grand Rapids, Michigan took part in the "Buy a Bomber" pro-

gram Raising over \$375,000 selling War Bonds and Defense Loan Stamps, the students bought a B-17 Bomber, and christened it, "The Spirit of South High," after which it flew off never to be heard from again. Sandra Warren has written a story of how students were able to raise so much money and the incredible "spirit" that led alumni, seventy-two years later, to solve the mystery of what happened to the bomber. Sharon's book will be on display with other South High memorabilia at the RAM in September.

She will also be sharing this extraordinary tale with us at our September Meeting, which will be held at the Community Cabin on September 5 at 7 PM.

GRAND RAPIDS SOUTH HIGH DISPLAY COMING TO RAM

Beginning July 23, 2019, memorabilia showing parts of the history of Grand Rapids South High School will be featured in a new display at the Rockford Area Museum. My wife

Janette (1958) and I (1956) are Rockford Area Historical Society members; graduates of the school and have put together an exhibit using items we have collected over the years.

South High School was opened in Grand Rapids on September 7, 1915 Sand located on the southwest corner of Jef-

ferson Avenue and Hall Street. At that time it was the third high school in the city with Central and Union the first two. When the school opened under the leadership of Principal Paul C. Stetson the students were mostly ninth graders, so there was not a graduating

class until 1918. On November 1, 1915 the first school weekly newspaper was published. It was called "The Pioneer" and contained a page called "Pioneer Ideals" written by Mr. Stetson. One of the displays

shows one of the first papers with the principal's remarks concerning the school and its future. Visitors can read what he said and apply his words to what happened later in its history.



South High started their athletic programs in 1915 and played Rockford in football losing 27-0. The coach at South was Percy "Pop" Churm, a legendary teacher and coach from 1915 until 1953. In 1916 his football squad evened the record by defeating Rockford 30-0.

Mr. Churm is shown in several pictures in the exhibit.

There is also a photo of a Rockford football game with Mr. Churm was the referee.

The 1918 yearbook, also on display, shows photos of the first graduating class along with lists of students in other classes. Organizations, athletic teams, faculty and other things make up the content. The yearbook is dedicated to Mr. Stetson and

Mr. Churm and "The boys of South High in the Service". One of the faculty is Edith Dennis who had a tie to Rockford because she taught here and coached girl's basketball before going to the city school where she taught until 1949.

Athletics were important to South High students and a new gymnasium was added to the school

in 1922, a football field and track were built later about a quarter mile or so

from the school. Gerald R. Ford participated in three sports and performed at all three facilities before graduating in 1931. A copy of the 1931 year-book is on display showing his senior picture with his signature beside it.

Of course, there is other Ford memorabilia shown. In 1938 Edward "Mike" Murphy was a graduate who later returned to South as a teacher and coach. His varsity basketball teams in the fifties and early sixties were very successful and respected.

Many South graduates from his time still enjoy meeting with him at reunions and other gatherings. Coach Murphy is recognized in the exhibit along with things on one of his players from the early sixties, Lee Lafayette.

South High closed as a high school in 1968 but remained as a junior high until 1979. The building is still there and now houses the Federal Job Corps. There are still many South graduates who are very active in

keeping the "Spirit of South High" alive. They meet often and reminisce about their experiences. The exhibit will be at the RAM until September 24, 2019 and should be interesting to all.

A WORD FROM THE BOARD ... Terry Konkle - President

At the June 2019 Rockford Area Historical Society (RAHS) regular meeting, officers for the 2019-2020 society year were elected. They are: President - Terry Konkle, Vice President - Bob Winegar, Recording Secretary - Jennie Griffee, Corresponding Secretary - Carla Blandford, Treasurer - Dianne Skiver, Trustees - Floyd Havemeier, Jon Stamp, Joan DeMaagd, Jerry DeMaagd and Programs/Publicity - Janette Konkle. Al Pratt is the Rockford Area Museum (RAM) Director, Kathy Christensen will continue to schedule most museum tours and all of the school tours along with working to find hosts and hostesses for our meetings. Pat Frye is the RAM research director with her assistant Jennie Griffee.

Members will probably notice that many of the names on our list are familiar because they have served before. Linda Critchell, who has been our Vice President for several years, decided to step down from the position, but will continue to work on many RAHS activities and functions as she has done in the past. The RAHS is very fortunate to have people like her to help make things successful.

The sudden, unexpected death of RAM co-director, Dick Johnston, has brought about some changes. The board has decided to try to split up some of the duties that Dick had as part of his job. We have hired a group to clean parts of the RAM including the rest rooms. Several members, Jon Stamp, Bob Winegar, Barry Bell, Jan and Terry Konkle and Joan and Jerry DeMaagd, have cleaned and are working on organizing the storage building and taken responsibility for the "Grandma's Attic" sale in September. They will also act as curators and work with the museum director on displays, and have moved several things into storage. Bob Winegar will become our person to work with "Pinkies' Place "concerning the sale of some of our

Every three years the RAHS has copies of the "Rockford Squire" microfilmed. This is done at Central Michigan University where we have two copies made. One is kept at the RAM and the other at Krause Memorial Library. The reason to wait for three years is that the cost is more efficient because you do not waste space. Members should know that the RAHS has done this for many years, and we have an extensive microfilm file with Rockford Newspaper history.

My wife, Janette, with help from others who make suggestions, has put together a schedule of programs for regular meetings this coming RAHS year. It is nearly complete and a copy through January 2020 is available in this Newsletter. Our September 5, 2019 program features author Sandra Warren who will discuss her book "We Bought a WWII Bomber, The Untold of a Michigan High School, a B-17 Bomber & The Blue Ridge Parkway!" The book gives details concerning the students of Grand Rapids South High School and their successful fundraising efforts to purchase a bomber for the war effort. To lead into the first program the RAM will have a display on South High School starting July 23 and going through September 24 (see information on front page of Newsletter).

NEW CATALOGING SYSTEM ALMOST READY FOR IMPLEMENTATION

Some time ago we realized that we needed to update our cataloging process for properly recording the donation of items for the RAM. Our current software was fine when the museum first started using it but we learned that it was not compatible with newer operating systems and updates were not available.

New software that we found or that had been recommended were either not suitable for us or were too expensive. We eventually found one that would suit our needs and could be set up and operated at NO COST with enough capacity to give us a great start toward converting our old records and entering new items. As we go forward we will incur some costs that will be less than we would incur with other systems. An advantage is that

costs will be incurred only as the need arises.

We should be able to anticipate those needs and budget for them without

being be put in a position of having to make decisions far in advance for capacity that we may not even need.

Two long time volunteers, Candy DeForest and Ian McCormick, our resident computer guru. have both spent time on this project. Some fine tuning is being done. Ian is writing a simple instruction sheet that will enable almost any of our volunteers to catalog donations.

The new cataloging system benefits include:

- * Simpler entry process. Anyone can learn it
- * Attaching photos to records
- * Linking multiple items
- * Generation of reports based on search criteria
- * Public viewing of collection online (later)

A lot of help will be needed to get the new system up to date with entries from the old system as well as new donations. This will be a long process.

Anyone with minimal computer experience will have no problem helping with this. If you can surf the internet, play games, read emails, or order from Amazon, you will find this very simple. This can be done at the RAM during any open hours. No advance scheduling or long time commitment is needed. Come in for an hour or an afternoon. We hope our members will seriously consider helping with this important project.

Training will be scheduled soon.

In conjunction with this new system, we are also implementing a new procedure that will allow us to get items on display or into storage and archival files more quickly, often even before the computer entries are made.

This is a departure from our old process that required items to be held until they were entered into the catalog system. This often caused unnecessary delays and sometimes created storage space problems if cataloging or decisions about placement of items was delayed.

We continue to look for ways to improve the RAM experience for our volunteers and visitors.

The event was attended by approximately 40 of the 70

These dedicated volunteers have earned the title of **Founding Volunteer**. Their time has been as important as the financial donations that the community provided to fund the new museum. They were each presented with a new name badge that featured the title of Founding Volunteer and a Gold Star above their names. These are the only people who will ever wear that badge or have that distinction.

Beginning immediately, these people and all other current and future volunteers will also have a colorful new pin to wear. It features the RAM logo with the word "Volunteer" below. It is hoped that they will wear them with pride and that the pins will stimulate some conversation about the great experience that volunteering at the RAM can be.

Thad Beard, Rockford City Manager, and Steve Servaas, former 63rd District Court judge who held court in the RAM's current building for 33 years, spoke to the group.

Beard thanked the volunteers for their service and also took some time to update the group about things happening in the city and to answer questions.

Servaas gave an entertaining speech that told about his early days as a judge in 1972 and other tales about some of his most interesting days in the downtown Rockford courthouse and at the new East Beltline location in 2009.

As President of the Rockford Area Historical Society, Terry Konkle also addressed the group to thank them for everything they have done.

After some cake, snacks, and refreshments, Al Pratt thanked everyone for attending and said he hoped they all were leaving with a renewed understanding of how important their efforts and dedication are and how much they are appreciated. He also urged them all to wear their pins and to have at least one serious conversation with someone about the RAM's constant need for additional volunteers in order to continue to increase its services to the area. The Rockford Area Historical Society (RAHS) has approximately 300 members.

Unfortunately there are only about 20 people who regularly carry the burden for everyone and that just isn't enough.




